What does your NSO Do?

NSOs are in the field a great percentage of their time. When in the field, they identify places in need of a city service or inspection. After making a request for a city service (such as debris removal from a vacant lot or a building inspection of a derelict property), they

track the progress, following up with the responsible department to see the request to conclusion.

Most requests are handled easily by a City operating department. Others require special attention due to the size or nature of the problem. NSOs troubleshoot in these

Legislators Take Up Budget Battle Following Spring Break Week

Ah, the glamorous life of being a state legislator! The average Missourian may picture us flying off to a tropical island on our Spring Break (just completed March 14-24), but that is not the norm for your state representatives and senators. Many state legislators spend spring break week working at the full- or part-time jobs that they maintain when not in Jefferson City. Most of us do celebrate having some extra time with our family and friends. Mostly my spring break was filled with answering mail that had piled up, getting my washer and car repaired, and completing a long overdue house-cleaning.

As we move into the final weeks of the Legislative Session, setting the budget for the next fiscal year will take up a significant portion of our time. This follows weeks of exhaustive appropriation committee hearings. Year after year these committees hear heart-wrenching testimonies from Missourians of every description. As a "low tax/low service" state, we frequently hear how underfunding of essential services contributes to pain and suffering. Legislators often reply: "I wish we could do something about that, but we don't have the money.

Who do you want us to cut in order to serve your group better?"

It is past time to address the inadequacy of Missouri's current revenue stream if we are going to build a vibrant economy, create healthy and educated communities, and offer a compassionate safety net for our elders and persons with disabilities. I have filed House Bill 2131 to create an income tax system that is modern, fair, adequate and sustainable to address this crisis. The proposed income tax system overhaul would lower taxes for the 60% of Missouri households that make less than \$47,000 annually. The wealthiest 20% of Missourians would be asked to assume a tax burden equal to the percentage currently being carried by the 80% below them in income, and this would produce much needed revenue for education, healthcare, roads, etc.

I am glad to see that an amendment that I offered in 2007 has been incorporated into the 2008 budget bills. In recent years, the Legislature has passed a three-percent pay increase for state employees. (Missouri's front-line workers are among the poorest paid in the nation.) My 2007 amendment asked that all the money avail-

able for raises be divided by the number of state employees so the same size raise would be given to all. The net effect of this would be to give a higher percentage raise to the lowest paid employees (about five percent) and a lower percentage to our top paid employees (about one percent). During an extended debate, two colleagues from across the aisle stood up to support my amendment. When the amendment failed by two votes, they promised to ask the majority party to offer a flat raise proposal in 2008 and have apparently kept their word.

Among my other priorities for the 2008 budget debate are: adequately fund K-12 and higher education; restore healthcare to the 180,000 Missourians who have lost Medicaid coverage since 2005; furnish adequate staffing for veteran's homes so that they can operate at capacity level; reinstate supports for workers with disabilities; offer tobacco use prevention and cessation resources; and increase community-based mental health services. Hopefully when the budget becomes final in early May, it will contain all these improvements.

BPWNA Meeting Minutes - March 20, 2008

Call to Order – Welcome from President Bill Byrd. 26 people present.

Review of Minutes – Pam Welsh moved to approve minutes from January meeting, Connie Petty seconded. Motion passed. Carrie Sleep moved to approve treasurer's report for Feb. meeting, Chad Johnson seconded. Motion passed. We also voted on the budget for 2008, Chad Johnson, moved to accepted the 2008 Budget as printed Pam Welsh seconded motion, motion passed.

Alderman and NSO Check-In's – Alderman Ken Ortmann spoke about Operation Brightside on April 12. The weather is getting warm and we need to stay on stop of the problems, need to let your alderman and your NSO's know where the problems are. Ken also mention about grass; when it gets 8 to 10 inches call him so he can get forestry to cut the grass which results in a charge to the owner of the building. The owners of Lemp Brewery and the owners are working out the details on an offer and a time line on the development.

Bill mentioned about Operation Brightside, please see Chad Johnson, Membership Chair.

Barb Potts Neighborhood Stabilization Officer, did announce that the reason that she was late, was due to the fact that she was driving the neighborhood checking on some nuisance properties. You don't have call on properties just on your block; you can call on any nuisance properties. She also suggested for everyone to take a different route on your way home from work. This gives more eyes on the overall neighborhood. She is also concerned abut Nebraska and Utah. This corner is just one of a couple of pockets in BPW that needs to be watched. You also need to turn in graffiti. It is important to call on graffiti, but you can take pictures of the graffiti and e-mail to her. She spoke about the basic quality of life issues, she needs every ones help. A resident brought up graffiti on the 3100 Block of Ohio, Operation Brightside is VERY behind on taking graffiti off, please keep reporting. Barb want everyone in the neighborhood to realize that it is time to "COME OUT OF YOUR COMFORT ZONE"

Resident live is the 3200 Michigan; made a comment about how great the police are in the 3rd District. Barb talked about how properties become nuisance properties.

Alderman Craig Schmid made the announcement

that the Penny Saver was closed due to remodeling, and he also mentioned about Operation Brightside.

Featured Speaker – Sgt Ron Hasty Refuse Division, STLMPD

Sgt Hasty and Officer Steve Tucker were introduced. Sgt Hasty thanked President Bill Byrd for the invite to the meeting to talk about "TRASH". He had handouts on the back table. Hasty and Tucker work for the Trash Task Force (TTF). With the warm season approaching, it is a battle every year it seems that people want to clean out their basements. This creates an issue in overfilling the trash dumpsters and Bulk Pickup. Sgt Hasty spoke about bulk trash pickup. Also the topic of rehabbers were dumping in the trash cans was spoken about. One thing that the TTF is looking forward to is a new law that requires proof that you have a commercial dumpster already ordered/paid for before a building permit will be issued. The TTF was started in 1991. There is not an easy answer for trash and we have to be the ears and eyes. Trash is a low priority, unfortunately. If you call the police about trash, please follow up with a call the CSB. If there is illegal dumping in the city of St. Louis it is now at a state level, no longer just City. The TTF going for max fines.

Committee Updates

Report on Recycling Project - Bill made the report. The Project Chair Laura Snell was unable to attend the meeting due to work. BPWNA has negotiated a discount rate for the first contract with Earth Circle. The discounted rate for the first year of curb side recycling will be 95.00 a year. BPWNA is hoping to have at least 50 people sign up. Bill did mention that the applications will be in the April newsletters. He did a show of hands at the meeting and there were about 15-20 people interested.

Music in the Park - "Blues Festival" will be in Benton Park on May 17, more details to come.

This \$28 charge is insurance for the repair of the sewer line from your house. However, this only covers the repair of the sewer line after it leaves your property to the connection with the main line.

In other words, if the sewer line break is in your yard, it is YOUR SEWER Line and you pay for the repair. What will it cost???? Anywhere from \$2000 to \$7000 depending upon what they have to go through to replace it.. This is why most buyers have a sewer line camera'd to make sure it is healthy. If you have lots of trees

in your yard, you may need to treat your sewer line to prevent tree roots from growing through it.

Many ways to prevent a foreclosure

Yard Waste Dumpsters and TRASH

It's that time of year again when we will be using the yard waste containers/dumpsters in our alleys.

Remember so that we don't cause problems for our neighbors and to ensure that the City will empty the dumpsters, lets follow these simple rules:

Yard Waste Dumpsters -

Cut the branches and debris into pieces no longer than 2 feet.

Having any dumpster be over loaded means that cars have problems navigating down the alley.

While we are talking about the yard waste dumpsters, the same thought pertains to our regular trash dumpsters:

Never put trash on the outside of the dumpster, in front, to the side, or behind.

The lid should always be able to be closed.


If the dumpster is full, walk a few feet to the next dumpster.

Bulk pickup items MUST be 3 feet away from any dumpster, just at YOUR property line in the alley.

If you see anyone illegally dumping, this means setting trash outside of a dumpster or overloading a dumpster, call 231-1212 and file a report. Give the evaluators the time, date, and location. Then call the Citizen's Service Bureau (CSB) at 622-4800.

Remember, as Sgt Hasty said at the March neighborhood meeting, we are looking at a new law that will make illegal dumping a crime at the state level, not just at the City level. There is not an easy answer for trash and we have to be the ears and eyes.

If you see rehabbers dumping in the trash dumpsters, this is illegal dumping. A new law will be in effect soon that requires a rehabber to have proof they have a commercial dumpster already ordered/paid for before a building permit will be issued.

What does your NSO Do?

cases to ensure problems with unusual circumstances do not fall through the cracks. Field work also includes some very tangible assignments:

- Tag for tow derelict cars which present a threat to public safety.
- Post public notices of Redevelopment Hearings by the Board of Alderman for blighted properties.
- Post notices of Housing Court Action, alerting residents of upcoming court dates for chronic offenders.
- Assist neighborhood Housing Corporations with inventories of vacant property.
- Besides conducting field surveys, NSOs spend time researching city records and other potential resources for the citizens. This includes but is not limited to:
- Research property ownership records
- Obtain, compile and interpret neighborhood crime statistics

- Check on tax delinquency status as needed
- Track code violations
- Track Housing Court cases
- Compile information on problem properties
- Explain ordinances
- Disseminate city service information

Community Organizers/ Problem Solvers

- NSOs help direct and focus city services by identifying problems and working on resolutions through operating departments.
- NSOs assist neighborhood associations and organize community improvement projects.
- NSOs also work with the police, elected officials, governmental agencies, social service organizations, community groups and individuals to identify permanent solutions to ongoing problems.


