# Healthy Corner Stores Go International

he Healthy Corner Store (HCS) Project in St. Louis hit a new milestone with the inclusion of its first Hispanic store. El Torito Supermercado on Cherokee Street joins Shaw Market, Manchester Market and Regal III as a healthy corner store.

When it comes to health, one of the goals of the Healthy Corner Store Project is to ensure access to healthy, affordable foods for all. To do that, it is important to ensure our health messages have broad reach within the population.

Unfortunately, language barriers may limit how well some area residents can access healthy messages. Gaining El Torito as a healthy corner store helps to remedy that problem, especially for the growing, local Hispanic population.

El Torito currently serves a


predominantly Hispanic population. In fact, people travel from as far away as St. Charles County and Illinois to shop at this supermarket.

When you visit, you understand why. Voted the best Mexican Supermarket in 2011 by the Riverfront Times, El Torito currently stocks a wide variety of traditional Mexican foods and many healthy options. His store attracts the population, but they still aren't getting the health messages to promote making the best choices given their available options.

In order to get the desired health messages to the population, the healthy corner store materials needed a few adjustments from the usual implementation. All healthy corner store signage was made bilingual so that it was informative for the majority Hispanic customer

base as well as the minority non-Hispanic customers. In-store tastings incorporated recipes with traditional Hispanic foods as key ingredients.

Recipes were dual-sided with one side in Spanish and the other in English. Elizabeth Warner from the University of Missouri Extension was on-site at each tasting to provide translation services for the Hispanic customers. To continue the healthy corner store messaging, the store owner was provided with reusable HCS grocery bags to give away to his customers.



All these changes were designed to promote healthy eating to a population that is sometimes missed by health messaging due to language barriers. Through these changes and continued healthy corner store activity by the store owner, we can impact this population in a positive way. Hopefully we can also begin to reduce some of the diet-related. health disparities experienced within our Hispanic commu-

#### 2015 BPW Board Elections

#### October 16, 7p - 2832 Arsenal, Five Star Senior Center

Duties of the six elected Board members, as outlined in the bylaws, are as follows:

President - preside at all meetings of the Corporation (Neighborhood Association) and of the Board of Directors at which he/she may be present; will perform such other duties as may be prescribed in these bylaws or assigned to him/her by the Corporation or by the Board of Directors. He/she will coordinate the work of the officers and committees of the Corporation in order that the purposes may be promoted. As well, he/she will keep and maintain all legal documents.

Vice-President - act as an aid

to the President and perform the duties of the President in the absence or disability of that officer to act. He/she will also perform other duties assigned by the board; as well as submit a monthly report to the board of directors when necessary.

Secretary - record the minutes of all meetings of the Corporation and Board of Directors meetings. Also, this person will maintain all correspondence of the corporation.

Treasurer – custody of all the funds of the Corporation; will keep a full and accurate account of receipts and expenditures; and will make disbursements as authorized by the Corporation's Board of Directors. The Treasurer will be responsible for the maintenance of the financial records of the Corporation as conforming to the bylaws of the Corporation. He/she will also submit a monthly accounting of the finances to the board of directors.

**Member-at-Large** – providing an additional voice for the members of the Corporation..

Additional Duties are outlined in the by-laws.

The committees are selected by nomination and also serve for one year terms. More detailed descriptions can be found on the BPWNA website (www.bentonparkwest.org) or by contacting any board meember

The committees are:

**Beautification Committee -** works to improve the appearance of the neighborhood.

**Block Link -** a connection point between the residents and the neighborhood association.

Communications – Includes: The newsletter–*The Porch Review* giving information in and around Benton Park West;
The website—providing information about BPW on the web;
Public Relations/Marketing—sharing with BPW and the world about the things that make BPW a wonderful place to live.

Community Garden – a variety of gardens are scattered throughout the neighborhood bringing beauty and product to residents. You are welcome to volunteer or relax in the garden!

**Dog Park** – providing a fenced, off-leash recreation space in which owners and dogs can safely interact and socialize.

Facilities – providing support by setting up meeting space, maintaining the neighborhood office and physical assets owned by BPWNA.

Finance/Fundraising – coor dinates the budget, planning for income to support the work of Benton Park West Neighborhood Association.

**Membership** – maintains and grows the association member-

ship, organizes various events and supports fundraising.

Safety and Quality of Life - concerned with trash/trashcans, drug sales, guns, burned out streetlights, overgrown grass, quality housing for residents, new developments, and making BPW safe and comfortable. The new COP (Citizen's on Patrol) team is organized under this committee

Youth Outreach - develops projects that specifically target the neighborhood youth and coordinates ways to include youth in regular neighborhood activities.

Dotential scammers are targeting the generosity of citizens near the St. Louis area. Multiple news stories from our area have recently detailed charges against people who allegedly created false charities for their own personal

Innocent and well-intentioned people who were looking to help others have found they were seriously taken advantage of instead. Often, the "charities" appear to be for a legitimate cause benefiting someone who seems to need help. But be aware or you could find yourself without some of your hard-earned cash.

The Federal Trade Commission has provided tips for avoiding these types of scams. When choosing to donate to a charity, be wary of organizations or individuals that do the following:

Will not provide proof that the contribution is tax deductible. To check if an organization is tax deductible, search on this site: http:// apps.irs.gov/app/eos/

- Will not provide details about the organization or cause including how the funds will be used.
- Use high pressure tactics to get you to

Portray themselves with a name resembling a better-known, reputable organization. How can you make sure that your contributions are going toward a good cause?

- Check the legitimacy of the organization through the Better Business Bureau Wise Giving Alliance: http://www.bbb.org/us/ charity.
- Research the organization or individual by searching the name of the organization on the internet and including search terms like "scam" or "fraud."
- Write a check. Avoid cash donations or donations that must be made by giving credit card information over the phone.

# Did you know? Police Explorers

The St. Louis Police Explorers Unit educates young adults on the purpose, mission and objectives of law enforcement agencies. Police Explorers have the opportunity to gain practical experiences while also serving the community. The Explorers program strives for participants to become better citizens and community members while promoting high standards of scholarship, character development and physical fitness.

The Police Explorers program offers an excellent opportunity for those interested in learning more about a career in law enforcement.

Participants in the program will learn about First aid and CPR, traffic control, radio procedures, self-defense, fingerprinting, conflict resolution and crime scene analysis. The Explorers curriculum often mirrors that of the St. Louis Police Academy. Explorers also have the opportunity to learn more about the justice system, local laws and department procedures.

In addition to weekly meetings, participants have the opportunity to attend both local and national conferences, seminars and academies. These events offer Explorers to



# CITY MUNICIPAL COURT WARRANT FORGIVENESS PROGRAM

Individuals can come to St. Louis City Municipal Court at 1520 Market Street [use the 16<sup>th</sup> Street entrance] from Monday, September 22<sup>nd</sup> through Friday, September 26<sup>th</sup>, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. to cancel warrants and get a new Court date.

For \$35, warrants will be cancelled and a new Court date issued – No matter the age of the warrant(s) or the number of warrants, the total cost is \$35.




