





After success made life easier, Frank was able to concentrate on his new story idea. Testing his ideas one evening during story time, he shared about Dorothy, the Scarecrow and the Tin Woodman. Asked where the "magic land" was located, he looked around the room and saw his filing cabinets; the bottom drawer O-Z. Hence the birth of the "Land of Oz".

Since then the story has been seen on stage and the famous movie.

Mayor Slay talks about Mobile Vending in the City - Food Trucks



Mayor Francis Slay

W ith patience, compromise, and a mayoral staffer who liked burritos, food trucks – I mean the sort of ties to allow a fleet of such trucks to try to find customers here without too much hassle.

Food trucks are just the tip of the iceberg for contemporary mobile retailing. In California, you can buy fancy flowers, designer shoes, and school supplies; get a haircut; or play video games – all from a truck. And such trends flow east. Just this past week, a stylish staffer asked for permission to see how a local truck that sells fashionable clothing could operate without too much interference on city streets.

My answer: yes, but remember that the road traveled by the burritos was a bumpy one at first.

We need to find out a way to license mobile boutiques – or florists, stylists, or anythingelseists - that does not put brick and mortar stores, who have already made substantial investments in their neighborhoods, at a disadvantage. We will also need to identify neighborhoods that will welcome them. And we will need to satisfy the revenue collectors and law enforcers.

After months of back and forth, food trucks generally abide by an enforceable set of rules outlining everything from food safety regulations to where and for how long they can park. They are welcome in some neighborhoods, but not in others. They are licensed and pay taxes.

The fashion truck and its mobile sisters are pirates for now, but I am confident we can figure this out fairly, too.

ers to give away if the buyer wants the hanger.

<u>Selling CD's or Books</u>? Arrange them in a box so the titles/artist can be read easily.

Selling Electronics? Have them turned on or an electrical outlet/extension cord handy (*REMEMBER* to put the cord away when not in use – so no one trips!!). Extra tip: if something needs batteries, use old ones.

<u>Selling Utensils</u>? Rubber-band knives and forks for ease of handling.

For Him: Set an old lawn mower or power tools out front and you'll get more business. Also set up a small table with nothing but "man-things" (jars full of screws and nails, electronic parts, tools and parts of tools, etc.).

<u>On a Hot Summer Day</u>: If your yard sale is on a hot day, consider selling bottled water.

Double Check and Recheck! Look through all boxes, drawers, pockets, etc. of everything you intend to sell. Make sure there is no personal information in/on anything you are selling.

Display: Design your layout to ensure buyers walk past everything and can easily pay for things. Make your layout as appealing as possible. Group similar items together, place small items and baby clothes on tables for better visibility. Fill empty spots as things sell. Place a few interesting items out front to draw attention. People make quick decisions on whether to stop or drive on by. Drivers who see a pile of clothes, dirty boxes, and unorganized junk will drive on to the next spot.

Play Background Music: Avoid the awkward silence, but be mindful of the volume *and* don't play any offensive music (remember you have neighbors!). Eighties Soft Rock and/or Motown are great options.

<u>**Price Everything!**</u> If you do not have time to price everything individually, signs are

helpful. For example: "all books \$0.25 each", or "any clothing item \$1.00", or "anything on this table \$0.50". You can use color coded stickers, such as: items with blue stickers are \$0.50, red stickers \$1.00, etc. Also - the bigger the item, the bigger the price tag. *** You do not want to keep answering "how much is this?" Make it obvious! Many buyers won't bother to ask, they will just move on and you will lose a potential sale.

Price Smartly! No one cares that you paid \$100 for a designer dress 5 years ago. You will be lucky to sell it at all. Look at your stuff objectively. One third of the original price is a good starting point for big ticket items in good condition. However, folks are very hesitant to pay for used clothes they cannot try on, but they may gamble for only \$1 or so. PEOPLE LOVE GREAT DEALS!!! If you have a ton of kids clothes or small toys consider having a "fill a bag for a set price" kind of deal, such as: 'fill a bag of clothes for \$3' or 'fill a lunch bag of small toys for a \$1'. You also can offer paperbacks \$0.25 each or 5 for \$1. If you have a bunch of items with missing pieces or broken parts, put it in a 'FREE' box with a note "broken - good for parts" or something similar. Price things evenly, e.g. \$0.25, \$0.50 and \$1, NOT \$0.45, \$0.75, \$1.35. This will make your calculations easy.

The Sale: Get prepared the night before to avoid the morning rush. Have plenty of bags available to bag merchandise. If selling breakables, have newspaper available for wrapping. Also have a calculator to make totaling purchases easy!

Avoid Any Hassles! Post a sign that says "All Sales Final".

FRAUD ALERT Social Security Reports Fraudulent Online Accounts Set Up



The Social Security Administration recently reported that possibly hundreds of thousands of Social Security Accounts might have been compromised nationwide. Dozens of people contacted or came to the Fenton, Missouri Office to report they had received letters from the Social Security Administration verifying they had recently established online accounts. However, the recipients of the letters had not established online accounts.


An online account with the Social Security Administration allows quick access to your account so that your earnings and monthly benefit information can be reviewed. An online account also gives the account holder the ability to change your mailing address and bank information for monthly deposits. With so much personal information available via the online account, it is a prime target for criminals trying to steal large amounts of money.

Our Fraud Prevention Task Force Director established an online account with the Social Security Administration in order to understand the process. In order for him to open an account, he had to provide his name, date of birth, current address, social security number, a partial credit card number, home mortgage holder, auto loan holder, former address and answer four security questions. As you can see, it requires a great deal of personal information to establish an online account. A criminal who tries to establish an account in someone elses name must be very familiar with the victim in order to open the account.

If you have received a letter from the Social Security Administration verifying the establishment of an online account and have never opened one yourself, you should immediately contact the Social Security Office of Inspector General at 1-800-269-0271. The office is open Monday through Friday from 10:00AM to 4:00PM.

If you suspect you've been a victim of this fraud you can go directly to your local Social Security Office. They will be able to put a freeze on your account so that the criminal who opened the account can no longer make changes.
