Roosevelt High A Bit of History

Did you know that the phrase "Roosevelt Rough Riders" was coined in the 1890's?

While it wasn't for a school or sports team specifically in Saint Louis, it was for a team that was fighting for you and me (or our parents and grandparents) at a federal level

"Rough Riders" was the name given to the First U.S. Volunteer Cavalry under the leadership of Theodore Roosevelt. Roosevelt was not President at this time, but May 1898 he joined the volunteer cavalry. The original plan for this unit called for filling it with men from the Indian Territory, New Mexico. Arizona, and Oklahoma. However, once Roosevelt joined the group, it quickly became the place for a mix of troops ranging from Ivy League athletes to glee-club singers to Texas Rangers and Indians. Roosevelt later became the 25th and 26th President of the United States.

Today our neighborhood high school shares the name with this courageous and forthright group of individuals.

Benton Park West Neighborhood Association recognizes the value of Roosevelt High School to he Youth of our neighborhoods. The neighborhood association donated \$ 200 last year to bene(Continued on page 11)

Residents Working Together ... Make Benton Park West Home

Looking out your front window one can see mother nature making changes. Flowers are

blooming and trees are budding.

Changes are also taking place in our neighborhood – Benton Park West (BPW).

Benton Park West is ever evolving. The neighborhood area is not what it was 100 plus years ago when it was a bustling and vibrant diverse neighborhood, nor is BPW the sad looking, dirty, perceived bad area it was just five years ago. It is up to each resident to maintain their own space, help maintain their block and alley in a community perspective, and even to keep a "mother's watch" on the entirety of Benton Park West and the surrounding areas.

Visual signs of change are coming from the Garden and Beautification Teams. These "inside" changes are making BPW more beautiful with a noticeable change. Watch for the flowers and vegetables to start showing themselves in the Gardens at Ohio and Crittendon and California and Wyoming. Look for more small concrete planters appearing though out the neighborhood. Watch for the continued work at the Arsenal and S. Jefferson lots in the space becoming much better to see. At this particular corner, watch the progress of the new planter.

Outward signs of change can be seen with the continued support of Cherokee Street and Cinco de Mayo. Cinco de Mayo is also an event where BPW has a booth that serves as a fundraiser. Later in May is the Blues Festival, May 17th, that is a collaboration of both BPW and Benton Park in a "party in the park" event for all residents of both neighborhoods.

Inward signs that are "physical" are new neighbors moving into BPW. Another interesting sign is current residents moving to other properties still within BPW. In the past few years, more and more renters are choosing to buy in BPW. Sometimes it is across the street from where they rented, other times it's blocks away... yet still in BPW. Also, there are current residents who have invested in properties in BPW as rental property or even to renovate for re-sale.

The non-physical inward signs can be seen with more and more people opening their doors and talking with neighbors or talking with the police. While each of us would like to think that BPW is crime free and perfect... we are not living in "Stepford". Benton Park West still has it's share, as an old historic City neighborhood, of quality of life issues. Many will say that the issues are bad, others would say the issues aren't as bad as they used to be. Even others would say to compare the type of crime and activity to four years ago and the current BPW looks GREAT.

Residents are what make Benton Park West the place one is proud to call "home".

Protect Children from Furniture-Tip Hazards

s a member of the Special Committee on Family Services of the Missouri House of Representatives, for four years I have begun each Wednesday morning with some of the most heart-breaking stories that could come to anyone's attention. This committee often hears testimony about children who have experienced abuse or neglect or families hurt by a state or local agency that did not respond quickly enough to save a child's life. Some legislators call this committee "the Kleenex Committee" because of the number of tears that get shed in our hearings, and yes, we legislators cry too.

Recently a hearing on House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 25 educated me about a problem that was new to me. That issue was the danger of "furniture tip-overs." A father from Kansas City told us the sad story of his two-year old son's death, a loss caused by a bedroom chest that tipped over. This dad had "child-proofed" his kitchen to get dangerous chemicals out of the reach of his children. He had used safety latches on cabinet doors and taken many other steps to

try to protect his children. It had not occurred to him that a 30-inch high piece of furniture could lead to such a tragedy.

Parents cannot keep their eyes on children every minute of the day, and children love to climb. In a brief unsupervised moment, very heavy furniture items can cause crush injuries, but more commonly when a large dresser, shelf, or home entertainment center tips, the resulting injury is often suffocation. Children become pinned between the tipping furniture and the bed or floor, unable to breathe or call for help, making it a nearly silent event. That is what happened to this man's son.

The dad later learned that the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) rates furniture tip-overs as number three of the top five hidden home hazards. The CPSC estimates that nationwide 3,000 children ages five and younger go to the emergency room each year with injuries caused by television sets falling or tipping over, and at least 100 people mostly young children - have been

killed since 2000 by falling televisions or other furniture.

I supported HCR 25 in committee and on the floor when the bill was perfected on April 16. I also brought home some anchoring devices that the grieving father had given to committee members so that we would know how to prevent injuries and deaths. I gave these to two families in my faith community who have toddlers so that they could make their homes safer.

As state representative for the 59th district, I hope that by sharing this information with neighborhood associations, education will happen to prevent other parents suffering the loss experienced by the dad whose story prompted HCR 25. Play it safe. Use straps, brackets, and anchors to secure furniture that could fall or tip over.



THEN step up to plate and either just share your opinions and ideas or actually get your "hands dirty" in helping to grow and mold our youth of today.
