ver the past six years a lot of changes have taken place in Benton Park West. At one point nearly any block you might drive or

walk down would have a dumpster in front of a building that was being renovated. Buildings always need updating and upkeep.

Just as buildings need care, people also need care and nurturing. We are lucky to have GREAT people who are residents in Benton Park West. These same residents didn't all just move in over the past eight years. We have a lot of residents who are "multi-generational". This means that either they live in a house where there are multiple generations who live in the same house (meaning more than two generations). Also, multi-generational residents include living in a house or apartment in which their parents or grandparents lived. One example is a couple who are living in the house that his grandparents not only lived in, but built. Another resident is living in the same house since he was a toddler, when his parents

moved there almost 80 years ago. A third example is a resident who lives in the house that his parents bought over 60 years ago and lived until they could no longer live in the home.

Residents have roots just as plants. Some roots go deep to seek food and water; other root systems can exist closer to the top. Either way, both thrive and do well with the same "tools". It's important that each of us understand the tools we need to thrive in our neighborhood. Economic Recession Keeps Budget & Job Creation at the Forefront of 2009 Legislative Session

he major issue of the 2009 Legislative Session was the state budget. With many Missouri jobs lost and sales tax receipts also down, finding a way to adequately fund our state's essential needs was a huge challenge. In March the House of Representatives passed a budget with deep cuts to Health, Mental health, and Social Services. Fortunately the Senate saw things differently and used about \$785 million from the federal economic stimulus package to fund most items in Gov. Jay Nixon's proposed \$23 billion budget.

In addition, a \$381 million of federal stimulus money was approved for

various special projects, including a \$112 million radio system for emergency responders and \$12 million for Metro buses. Gov. Nixon has said he will veto some of the other items in the bill to reserve funds for a projected shortfall next year.

A showdown over a massive tax credits package framed by both Democrats and Republicans as "economic development" was another prominent issue. It passed on the final day of Session, and I was one of only two no votes. The bill imposed some caps on two tax credits that have been important to the 59th district - historic preservation and family develop-

ment accounts. Other tax credits that have failed to prove themselves as job creators in the past were expanded, and they also operate without adequate transparency and accountability.

Among other measures that passed in 2009:

Child support: Men would have two years to challenge paternity rulings with DNA tests and also could be referred to jobtraining or drug-treatment programs rather than to prison if in arrears for child support payments.

DNA testing expansion: Those 17-years-old and up would have to give a DNA sample upon being arrested on suspicion of most felonies. The sample would be discarded if the case leads to acquital/dismissal.

Protection for purchasers of pre-need funeral packages: Following a scandal at St. Louis-based National Prearranged Services and its affiliates, tougher monitoring and new rules were set up to offer protections.

Motorcycle helmets: I

hope Jay Nixon will veto a bill allowing riders who are at least 21 years old to skip wearing a helmet when riding a motorcycle on an interstate highway.

Text messages: Motorists 21 and younger will not be able to legally send or read a text message while driving, except in emergencies. (I don't see why people of any age should text while driving.)

I was glad to see three very flawed tax reform measures die in the Senate, and allowing conceal and carry on college campuses died too. Unfortunately quite a few good ideas died as well: my tax reform plan, expansion of health coverage to 35,000 low-wage working adults. health coverage for children with autism, etc. We must keep organizing and fighting the good fight so that we are able to make progress on these issues next year.

Yard Waste Dumpsters and TRASH

t's that time of year again when we will be using the yard waste con-

tainers/
dumpsters in our
alleys. Remember
so that we don't
cause problems
for our neighbors
and to ensure
that the City will
empty the dumpsters, lets follow
these simple rules:

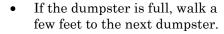


Yard Waste Dumpsters -

- Cut the branches and debris into pieces no longer than 2 feet.
- Having any dumpster be over loaded means that cars have problems navigating down the alley.

While we are talking about the yard waste dumpsters, thesame thought pertains to our regular trash dumpsters:

- Never put trash on the outside of the dumpster, in front, to the side, or behind.
- The lid should always be able to be closed.



 Bulk pickup items MUST be 3 feet away from any dumpster, just at YOUR property line in the alley.

If you see anyone illegally dumping, this means setting trash outside of a dumpster or overloading a dumpster, call 231-1212 and file a report. Give the evaluators the time, date, and location. Then call the Citizen's Service Bureau (CSB) at 622-4800.

There is not an easy answer for trash and we have to be the ears and eyes. If you see rehabbers dumping in the trash dumpsters, this is illegal dumping.

Also, don't forget about recycling.

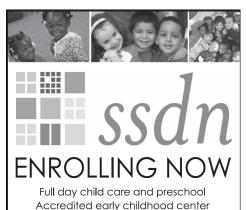

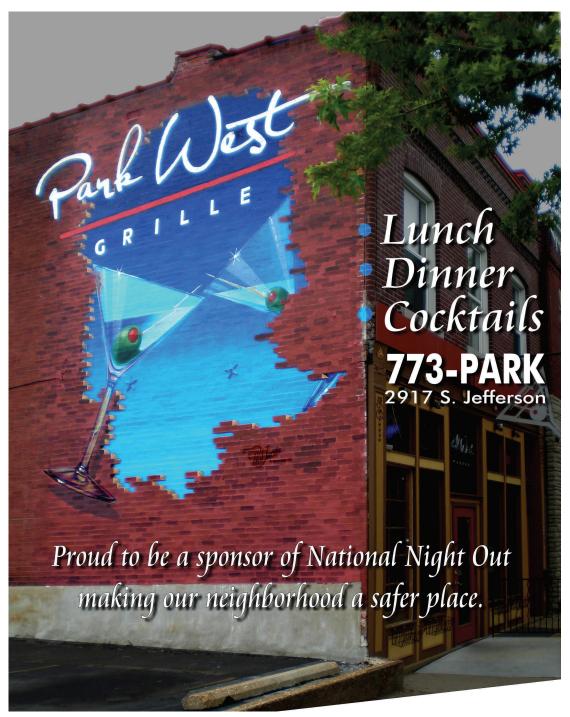

folks who were found with fireworks last year (or to addresses about which calls were made for fireworks being exploded) and to those whom neighbors identify as likely to have them this year. This letter normally indicates that it is against the law and what the consequences are. If you have addresses where you suspect fire-

works will likely be a problem this year, you can give them to me, and I will send them to the appropriate person in the police department. Or, you may want to submit them to the captain for the district in which the address is located.

The police also tend to watch these addresses to see if there are fireworks problems at them.

Nuisance Issues - Identify and Report

Thanks to Alderman Craig Schmid for providing this information as a reminder of how to identify nuisance properties and tools to report concerns to the correct individuals.

Next month look for how to define: "what exactly is a nuisance?"

o you wonder why that great house you live in cost you less than if the same house were across Jefferson Avenue in Benton Park? Well, you're in a "fixer-upper" neighborhood. That means that, while Benton Park West can offer a lot of great house and a good community for the price, is still under construction. While others may be saddled with huge mortgage payments, you live in an area that that requires some "sweat equity." The sweat equity spoken of here is not just physically on your house, but your neighborhood. In order to get the job done in a timely manner, we need to rely on each other as we reinvest to create greater quality and

Know your neighbors and your tool kit.

It takes time, commitment, and education. There is no substitute for "rolling up your sleeves" (figuratively and literally) and getting to know your neighbors, picking up trash, being vigilant and demanding (respectfully) City services. There are a number of community building tools at your disposal. The newsletter and neighborhood leadership can help you with many of these tools. In this column, the nuisance property process will be addressed.

Who Ya Gonna Call?

First of all, once you get the hang of it, "it ain't rocket science." At its basic core there are 3 numbers to remember

(forgive me Captain Leyshock of the SLMPD-3rd District). You must be observant, you must be willing to communicate, and you must have some patience for resolution. The 2 numbers you need to remember are 911 and 231-1212 (the non-emergency number for police service). Use the 231-1212 number unless your situation involves life/death issues, guns/drugs, or other life threatening situation.

Now, the observant part of this is not really difficult. You already have observed (seen, heard, felt, smelled, etc.) something that is a problem and harming the quality of life for the neighborhood. The next step is to translate the observations into a checklist..

- Note the address of the issue (always give the address of the offending building)
- Describe in detail the nuisance behavior. For example, a bunch of people standing around is not considered a nuisance, but if they are noisy, block the sidewalk, wave down cars, etc. then there is a nuisance.
- Describe the persons in-

- volved: height; weight; gender; race; age; hair color and style; facial hair; markings, tattoos; earrings, rings, or other unique identifiers; clothing; name or nickname (if known).
- Tell your NSO and Alderman the time when this behavior most frequently occurs, if there is any pattern
- If there is suspected drug activity, how do the transactions occur (on foot, by car, signals, travel routes, lookouts, drug storage locations, etc.), and where do they occur (in the street, alley, on the porch, in the house, at the car)?
- No matter what tool you use it is important to keep a log of the details. Bring your log to the monthly Weed & Seed meeting at Five Star Senior Center every 2nd Tuesday starting at 7p.

Thank you for your efforts to make the Benton Park West Neighborhood the very best it can be. I encourage you to be active in the Benton Park West Neighborhood Association and on your block.

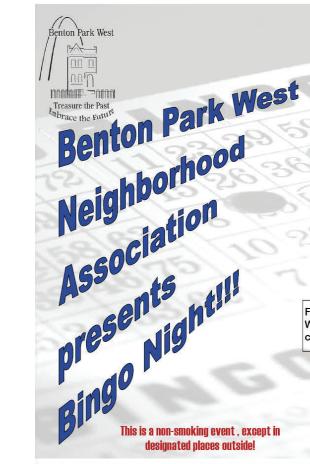

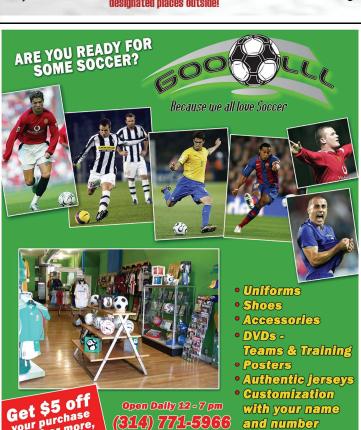

"The Garden Spot"

What to do in the garden this month:

- Deadhead spent perennials and annuals
- Remove infected leaves from roses.
- Newly planted trees and shrubs should be watered thoroughly once a week
- Maintain a 2-3 inch layer of mulch around tomatoes and peppers to prevent blossom-end rot.
- Plant zinnia seed by July 4.
- Dig potatoes when tops die.
- Sweet corn is ripe when silks turn brown.
- Divide bearded iris at the end of the month.
- Prune climbing roses and rambler roses after bloom.
- Don't pinch mums after mid-July or you may delay the flowering

This month's hint:

Water is essential to keeping your plants healthy and productive in this extremely hot weather. Water stress can set your plants back to the point where they will never recover. Hand watering, sprinklers and soaker hoses will all do the trick, choose the method that best suits your availability. If you are not home for days at a time, get a timer that will turn the water on for you. It's just too risky to count on Mother Nature to provide adequate rainfall. After all the trouble of creating a vegetable garden, a few more hours watering is not that difficult and it gives one the chance to inspect the progress of the garden

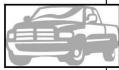

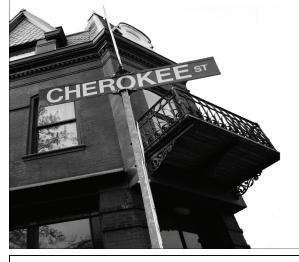

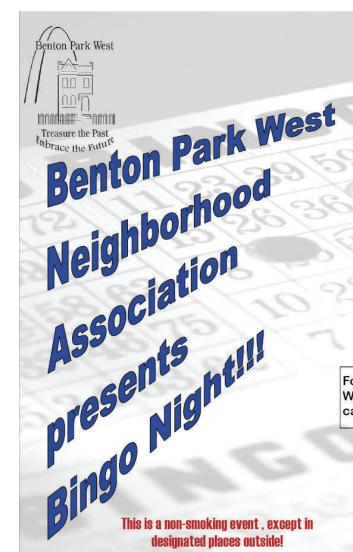
